LESSON

Jeremiah 2:4-13

Hear the word of the LORD, O house of Jacob, and all the families of the house of Israel. Thus says the LORD: What wrong did your ancestors find in me that they went far from me, and went after worthless things, and became worthless themselves? They did not say, "Where is the LORD who brought us up from the land of Egypt, who led us in the wilderness, in a land of deserts and pits, in a land of drought and deep darkness, in a land that no one passes through, where no one lives?" I brought you into a plentiful land to eat its fruits and its good things. But when you entered you defiled my land, and made my heritage an abomination. The priests did not say, "Where is the LORD?" Those who handle the law did not know me; the rulers transgressed against me; the prophets prophesied by Baal, and went after things that do not profit. Therefore once more I accuse you, says the LORD, and I accuse your children's children. Cross to the coasts of Cyprus and look, send to Kedar and examine with care; see if there has ever been such a thing. Has a nation changed its gods, even though they are no gods? BETHESDA-BY-THE-SEA SURVEY RESULTS

General Overview

There were 471 parishioners who took the survey. Below is an overview of the results. The statistics presented are not necessarily reflective of the entire parish community, only of those who completed the survey. The Rector Search Committee greatly appreciates the time and effort of those who participated. Thank you all.

Who are we?

61% female

47% age 66 or over; 27% age 56-65; 20% age 36-55

58% married

96% white

19% have incomes less than \$50,000; 59% have incomes over \$100,000

49% are employed; 38% are retired

79% are college graduates with 42% holding post-graduate degree

82% are full-time residents

15% have children under age 18 living at home

43% live less than 10 minutes away; 33% drive 20 minutes or more to attend

49% attend services once a week or more; 10% attend only occasionally, on holidays, or not at all

Service attendance: 12% 8:00 a.m.; 35% 9:00 a.m.; 44% 11:00 a.m.

99.6% are baptized; 91% are confirmed or received

63% have been attending more than 10 years; 21% have been attending 5 years or less

77% make an annual pledge

43% participate in the worship service ministries (altar guild, usher, greeter, reader, choir, Eucharistic minister, acolyte, etc.)

32% do not volunteer in any ministries

How do we view Bethesda?

89% are content with Bethesda's opportunities for enriching spiritual life

71% find that Bethesda offers sufficient pastoral counseling; 20% had no opinion

81% find Bethesda warm and welcoming

72% believe Bethesda encourages newcomers to participate

80% believe Bethesda lets parishioners know about volunteer opportunities

99% highly value our church building and surrounding grounds

Church School:

46% of the total had no opinion

Of those with children living at home, 64% believe the program should change to encourage more participation

Youth Program:

49% of the total had no opinion

Of those with children living at home, 63% believe the program should change to encourage more participation

Adult Education Classes:

- 27% believe the amount offered should remain the same
- 27% believe a greater variety of types of classes should be offered
- 31% had no opinion

Content of Adult Education:

- 37% believe it should offer a combination of biblical and contemporary topics
- 22% believe the content should remain the same
- 27% had no opinion on the content

Worship Services:

- 46% would like the worship services to remain the same
- 57% would like the music during worship to remain the same

Quantity of Fellowship Events:

- 43% would like the fellowship opportunities to remain the same
- 38% would like the fellowship opportunities to increase in number
- 19% had no opinion; 0% want the opportunities to decrease

Types of Fellowship Activities:

- 61% like events with guest speakers
- 35% like picnics after services
- 34% like evening receptions
- 29% like dinners
- 28% like prayer groups
- 26% like lunches

Outreach:

- 53% believe our level of outreach should remain the same
- 80% believe providing hands-on aid to those in need in PB County is important
- 22% believe providing hands-on aid to those in need outside of PB County is important
- 62% believe giving financial grants to charities in PB County is important
- 17% believe giving financial grants to charities outside of PB County is important
- 71% believe it is at least somewhat important for BBTS parishioners to share their faith with others outside of Bethesda
- 95% believe it is at least somewhat important for the local community to be aware of BBTS and its ministries
- 89% believe it is at least somewhat important for BBTS to cooperate with other religious organizations in meeting community needs
- 77% believe BBTS cooperates with other religious organizations in meeting community needs

Finances and Stewardship:

33% want BBTS to emphasize financial needs once a year

48% want BBTS to emphasize financial needs year-round

29% want BBTS to rely on lay leaders to actively request funds

98% believe that having a balanced budget is important

69% indicate that BBTS is a top priority in their financial giving

Programs of the Least Importance to Parishioners:

1. professionally designed altar flowers (358 responses)
2. hands-on outreach outside of the local community (278 responses)
3. musical concerts (211 responses)
4. paid choir (187 responses)
5. bookshop (174 responses)

What do we hope for in a new rector?

61% indicated it does not matter if our rector is male or female

58% indicated it does not matter if our rector is married

79% indicated it does not matter if our rector has minor children

51% would be comfortable with a rector of any ethnic background

Theology:

89% do not want the rector to interpret the Bible literally and absolutely word for word true

34% would like the rector to have a traditional theological viewpoint

39% would like the rector to have a moderate theological viewpoint

23% would like the rector to have a progressive theological viewpoint

Liturgy:

48% would like the rector to keep the liturgical style the same as it is currently

33% would like the rector to perform the liturgy with moderate ritual

Preaching Style Desired:

1. inspirational (223 responses)
2. thoughtful about contemporary issues (184 responses)
3. variety of most of the styles mentioned (164 responses)

Speaking Style When Preaching:

32% prefer conversationally

54% prefer a blend of styles

Experience:

73% believe it is important or very important that the rector has a history of growing a parish

90% believe it is important that the rector is fiscally knowledgeable

67% prefer the rector to have previous experience as a rector

Leadership Style:

84% prefer a rector who exhibits strong leadership but is flexible and considers the opinions of staff and lay leaders prior to making major decisions

50% prefer a rector who encourages staff and lay leaders to take initiative in developing programs and practices

83% prefer a rector who uses a blend of new and currently used ideas and methods

95% prefer a rector who deals constructively and responsibly with critical comments as they are received

96% prefer a rector who works equally well with groups and individuals

Desired Traits (in order of importance):

1. strong personal faith
2. approachable and sincere
3. good preacher
4. communicates well
5. sense of humor
6. strong leadership skills

Most Important Tasks of the Clergy for BBTS's Future:

1. preaching (227 responses)
2. church growth/development (195 responses)
3. financial stewardship (194 responses)
4. spiritual guidance (191 responses)
5. administration (165 responses)
6. liturgy/worship (142 responses)
